Accommodation Challenges

- Both Wildwood and West Springs were at capacity for Fall 2013 and are projected to be overcapacity for Fall 2014
- We are monitoring enrolment at Vincent Massey School

Community Engagement Process

The CBE values the public's involvement in planning for excellent student learning environments. To achieve this we aim to:

- Strengthen communications between parents and the CBE
- Engage potentially affected or interested stakeholders in meaningful consultation processes

Administrative Regulation 1090

The CBE has a formal policy, Administrative Regulation 1090: Student Accommodation Planning Process, which outlines how student accommodation issues are addressed:

Step 1 – Identification of student accommodation needs

Step 2 – Development of accommodation plans

Step 3 – Engagement with stakeholders; and

Step 4 – Consultation with Superintendents' Team

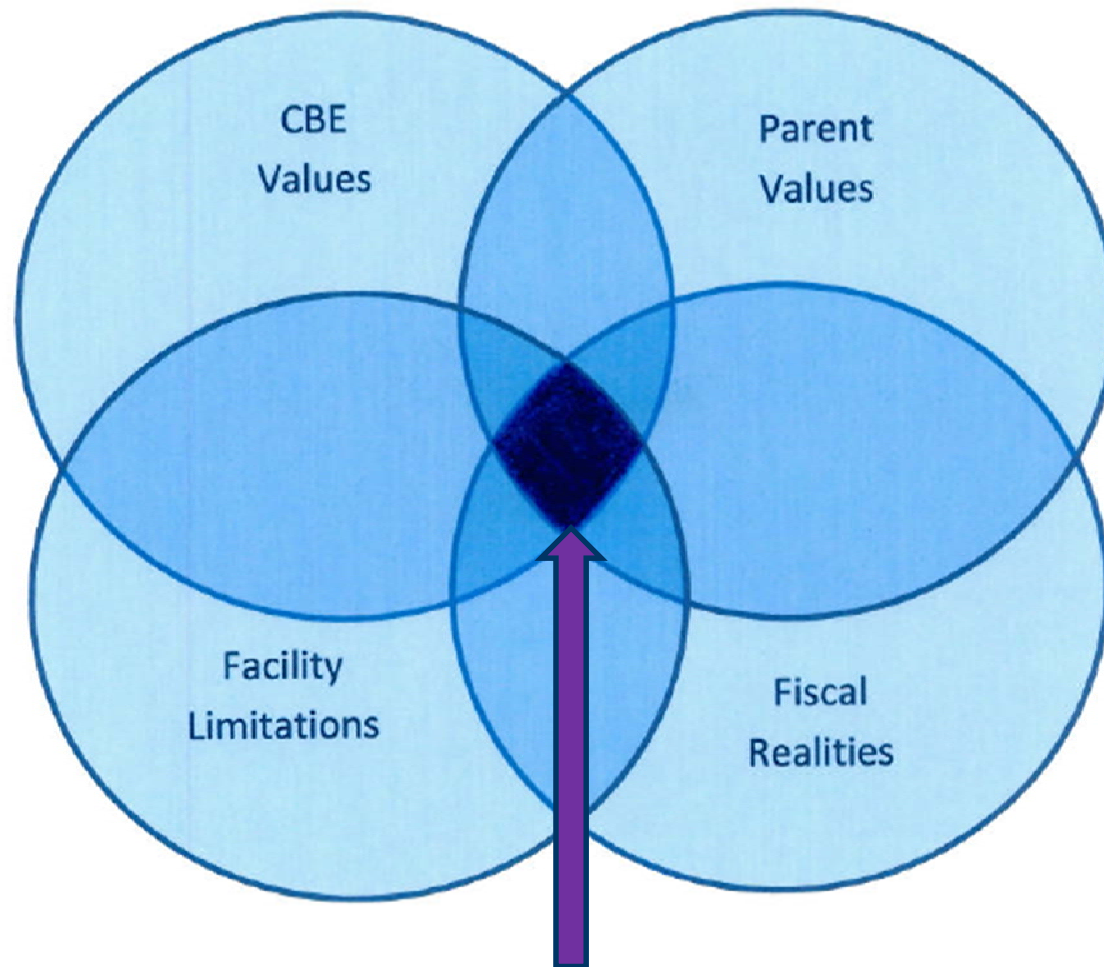

School Enrolment Information

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West Springs

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West Springs Residential District

- Housing construction in West Springs started in 2000
- West Springs is planned for a population of 13,200 to 13,900 people
- As of the 2013 Civic Census, the population of West Springs is 8,575 (approximately 53% built-out)
- We anticipate the community to be fully built-out in the next 5 - 10 years
- West Springs School planned to accommodate K-4 students, projections indicated the school would not be fully utilized in the first few years.
 - January 2010 parents were engaged about grade configuration and the school opened as K-5 and then expanded to grade 6.

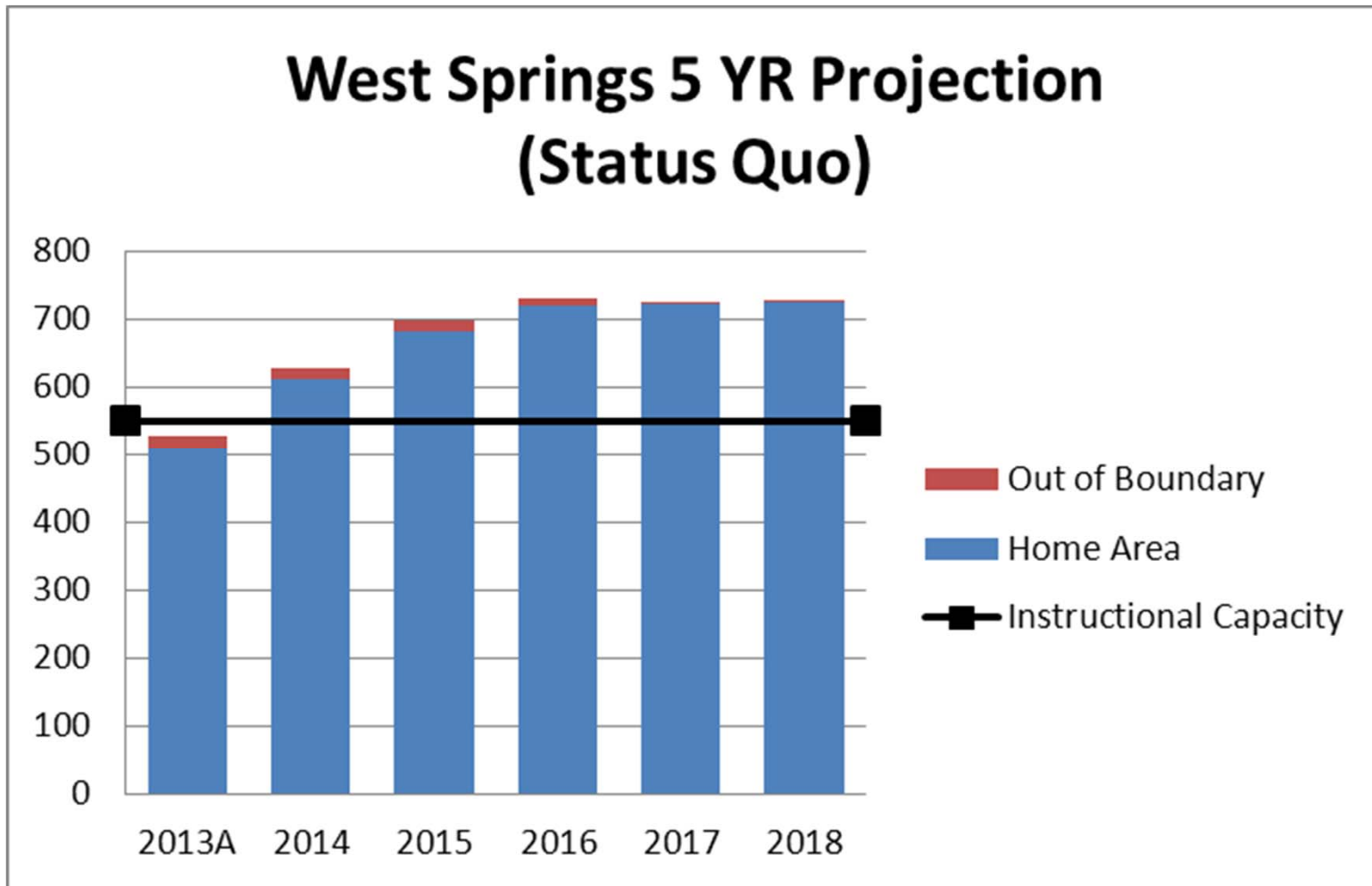

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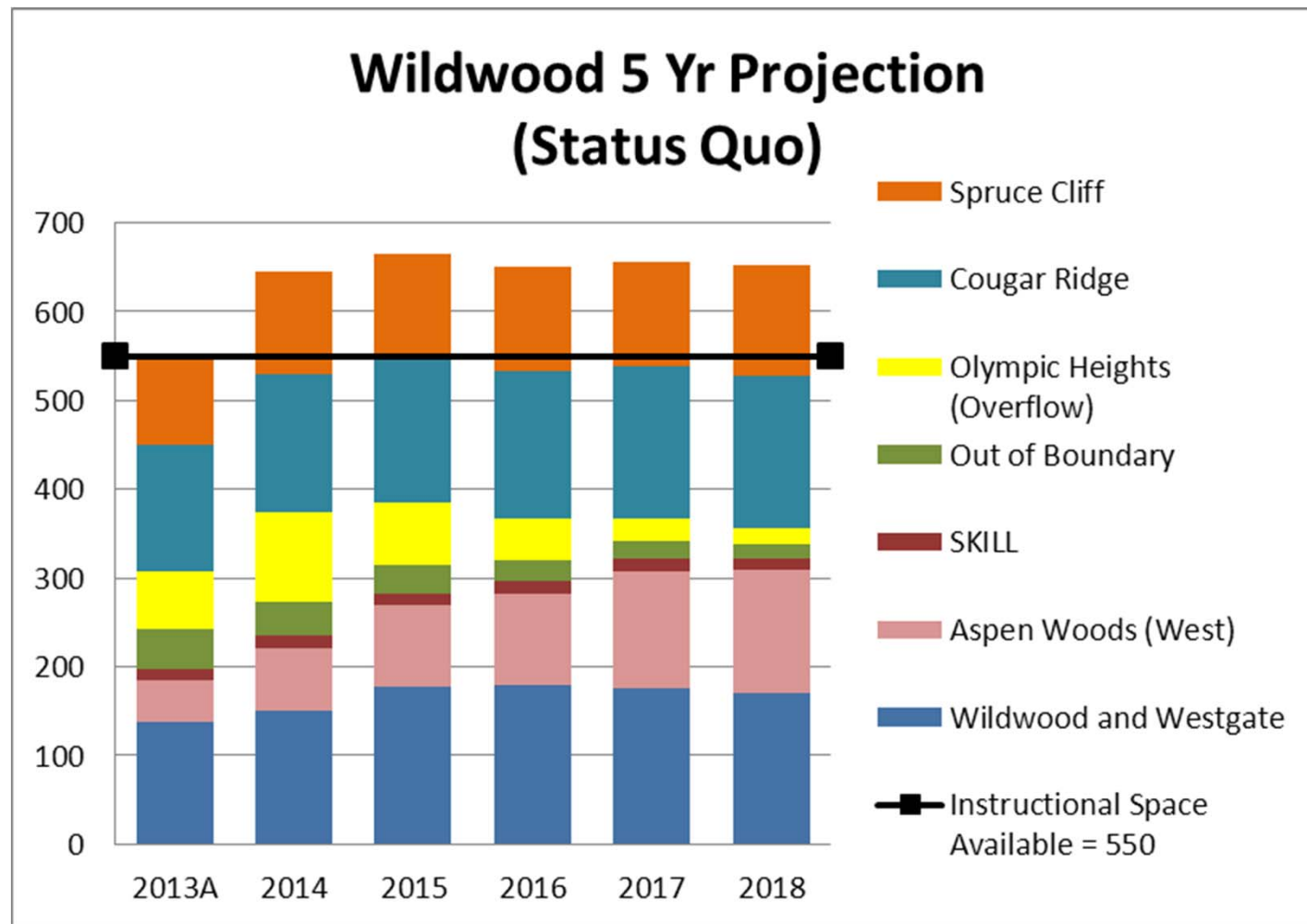
