



Trustees are members of the Board

- No individual authority
- Formal decisions are made by majority vote

Fiduciary Duty

Act in the best interest of the CBE

Oversight

- The Board does not get involved in day-to-day operations
- The Board provides oversight to ensure that its policy expectations are being met











Governance

- Establish expectations for student results and operational performance through policy
- Results Policies and Operational Expectations can be found on the <u>CBE website</u>
- Annually monitor performance against the expectations set in policy

Role of School Councils

- School councils are highly valued!
- They exist to advise the principal and Board of Trustees on school matters, and to ensure the parent and community perspective is represented in school decision-making.
- School councils consult on topics such as annual school budgets and school development plans.
- It is not the primary function of the school council to fundraise.
- School councils do not participate in school governance, employment issues and school management.
- School councils can create a space where parents, students, teachers and communities can be connected and engaged, which is a key to increasing student success.




Enrolment Update



143,000 students

This is an increase of 5,000+ students enough to fill 8+ elementary schools





40,000+ English as an Additional Language (EAL) Learners







Record Enrolment Means:



Increasing complexity



Additional resources being deployed



 Schools are full – 30 per cent of all schools are at/over capacity



More riders, more routes, more buses











July Funding Announcement

- Government announced an additional \$125M in one-time funding to address increasing enrolment, rising operational costs, inflation
- CBE's share is about \$20M*
- Majority of dollars are being directed to classrooms to support teaching and learning
- A portion to reduce operating pressures and optimize learning spaces

Connecting Students to Career Interests

- CBE offers a variety of opportunities to explore hands-on development of career skills, post-secondary learning and on-thejob training experience as part of their high school learning plan
- No tuition
- Students can earn high school credits.
 Potential to earn Industry credentials / post-secondary credits too

Need for Learning Spaces

- Need for new schools, modernizations and modular classrooms
- 56% of CBE schools are over 50 years old
- Modernized environments can help CBE expand opportunities in CTS and STEM
- Modular classrooms provide some relief for full schools

School Construction Accelerator Program

- Government recognized the need for more spaces.
- Provincially:
 - \$8.6B over three years (a \$6.5B increase)
 - 30 new schools/year for next three years
 - Fast-tracked approvals mid-year
- CBE did not receive any new approvals
- CBE has 13 new school projects that are siteready
- 47 modular classrooms are being installed this school year










2025-28 Capital Plan requests

New School Requests






