As a learning organization, we are committed to advancing the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action focused on Education for ReconciliACTION.



Key Highlights

- Overall the provincial budget has increased from last year
- Change made to funding formula model
- CBE is receiving an additional \$55 million compared to 2024-25.
- Budgetary pressures are linked to inflation, labour costs, and growing student complexity












Budget Planning for 2025-26

- Fees always reflect actual costs.

Every Cent of Provincial Funding Support Students














Board Advocacy Points

Budget 2025-26 does not provide the funding necessary for a growing school district.

- The CBE received an increase to provincial funding to account for increased enrolment.
- Provincial budget does not address inflation and the real cost of supporting students with increasingly complex learning needs.

Funding enrolment growth without addressing inflationary pressures results in growing class sizes and services and supports that don't keep pace with enrolment growth and need.

Annual funding not keeping pace with enrolment, rising costs, inflation






Capital Planning Update

Strategies for Managing Space

- Schools are using staffrooms, learning commons and other spaces for classroom learning
- In schools that are full, new registering students are overflowed to other schools with space
- Monitoring enrolment and long-term space planning including redesignating communities/changing grade configurations
- Adding/relocating modular classrooms











New Spaces Being Created

- Modular approvals will create 1,575 spaces in 13 schools
- Overflow eliminated at Sir Winston Churchill HS
- All Gr. 10 students accepted at Joane-Cardinal Schubert HS, North Trail HS can accept an additional 76 students
- Nelson Mandela HS drops from 125% to 116% utilization
- Re-opening Windsor Park creates 200 spaces for regular programming
- Consolidating Chinook Learning Services at Spruce Cliff frees up 550 high school spaces
- All Boys Program closure will open up 250 spaces at Sir James Lougheed









Local Decision-Making Matters

- Capital Planning Project Ranking Criteria -Approved Oct 2024
- Calgary's growth in developing communities
- Calgary's growth in established communities
- Built the case for a balanced approach for increased funding requests for new schools and school revitalization projects
- Recognized challenges related to 'site readiness'
- Advocacy within an evidence-based, transparent and fair prioritization of what Calgary needs



Approved School Projects






