What is important to your school community?

1. Funding, Fundraising & Resource Inequities

- High costs of playgrounds, outdoor structures, and facility upgrades
- Restrictions on casino funds and inequitable fundraising capacity across communities
- Pressure on school councils to fund basic needs
- Confusion about how Boards allocate funds and how to prioritize spending
- Desire for grants, partnerships, and clearer communication about funding rules

2. Parent Engagement, Communication & Volunteerism

- Difficulty reaching families through current communication channels
- Need for more inclusive, flexible, and creative engagement strategies

5. Facilities, Playgrounds & Outdoor Learning Spaces

- Playground lifespan, cost, inclusivity, and replacement
- Outdoor classrooms, gardens, naturalized spaces
- Shade structures, pergolas, and CBE approval processes
- Safety and maintenance of school grounds
- Overcrowding and the impact of split communities

What creates community at your school?

1. Events, Celebrations & Shared Experiences

- School-wide events: BBQs, dances, movie nights, fiestas, craft fairs, danceathons
- Fun lunches, snacks, potlucks, food trucks
- Free or low-cost events that include all families-cost events that include both local and bused families
- Seasonal or cultural celebrations (ornaments, hoop dancing, Bhangra)

2. Supporting Students, Families & Staff

- Gift cards, clothing, community pantry
- Teacher appreciation efforts
- Donation options to help cover student fees
- Zen corners, exercise bikes, safe/welcoming spaces
- Helping families in need, especially after December holidays

3. Collaboration Between Parents, Staff & Administration

- Principal, teacher, and parent participation in events
- Special speakers at council meetings
- Clear communication about school happenings
- School council networking across wards
- Community user groups (badminton, language schools) sharing the space

4. Student Belonging, Leadership & Cross-Grade Connections-Grade Connections

- Student created banners, grade highlights, leadership roles
- Clubs, extracurriculars, band, sports, arts programs
- Opportunities for older and younger students to connect
- Activities that celebrate diversity and identity

5. Communication, Accessibility & Welcoming Environments

- Social media updates, shareable calendars, community TV
- WhatsApp groups, playground meetups, after-school time
- Safe, welcoming entry practices for parents
- Hybrid meetings and flexible engagement options

What are the most important topics for your school council?

1. Funding, Resource Allocation & Financial Stewardship

- Class size funding, per student funding, and supports for students with complex needs
- Casino funds, general funds, and how to distribute money fairly across grades
- Unpaid student fees, food insecurity, breakfast/lunch programs
- Facilities issues (washrooms, windows, furniture, HVAC)
- Funding for playgrounds, buses, technology, library updates
- ASCE grant usage and co-hosting events to maximize funds

2. Parent Engagement, Volunteer Recruitment & Council Participation

- Low parent engagement and small council sizes
- Difficulty recruiting volunteers for casinos and events
- Strategies to increase involvement (events, varied meeting formats, feeder school outreach)
- Clarifying the purpose of school councils and amplifying parent voice
- Tools like Konstella app, newsletters, social media, and teacher presentations

3. Communication & Transparency Across the School Community

- Communication from council to parents and from school to families
- Principal reports, Q&A with trustees, curriculum updates
- Marketing-style opt-in communication, shareable calendars-in communication, shareable calendars
- Transparency about how funds are used and what councils contribute

4. Student Safety, Well Being & School Culture

- Bullying (especially in bathrooms), supervision, safe pickup/drop-off-off
- Safety inside and outside the school, including jaywalking and traffic issues
- Culture of belonging, no bullying expectations, welcoming environments
- Addressing food insecurity and supporting vulnerable students
- Ensuring facilities are safe, functional, and comfortable

5. Learning Environments: Class Sizes, Supports & Educational Quality

- Advocating for smaller class sizes and balanced complexity
- Supports for students with complexity
- Curriculum discussions and access to educational resources

Wards 1 & 2

- Can we leverage YMCA / City partners with EducationMatters to put these kinds of experiential activities more prominently as a board of schools
- How do Boards manage funding priorities / choosing how to split funds between buckets
- Communicate and feedback from parents on how to allocate funding to buckets, hard to reach via Facebook, Instagram, Emails

Wards 11 & 13

Summary

Our tables decided to combine so that we could hear from more voices and have more time with our trustee.

A round table introduction uncovered that we had a high number of first-year school council participants in our group. We initially started with the prepared questions, however the conversation took a more organic direction after that.

Key topics were:

- Funding
- Purpose of school councils
- Parent engagement strategies
- Communication
- Volunteer recruitment
- Sports Direction
- School welcoming environment

Funding

Key funding concerns included school facilities (being noisy and having outdated furniture/fixtures), playgrounds, school-owned buses. Fundraising activities were also discussed, primarily focusing on casino fundraising and volunteer needs. The use of the \$500 engagement funding from ASCE for speakers or workshops was discussed, as well as the potential for co-hosting events with other high schools to maximize these funds and increase attendance across more schools.

Purpose of School Councils

A central conversation revolved around the purpose of school councils and ensuring meaningful parent involvement. A speaker suggested the council's role was to hear the parent voice and that involvement in this group and the ASCA and utilizing available resources, was important and would be helpful for those new to the role. Advocacy, communication, and bringing the parent voice to the table were key themes under the purpose discussion.

Strategies for Parent Engagement

The largest pillar of discussion was parent engagement, covering how to encourage parent involvement. Ideas included hosting fun, community-building events like dances at the elementary level, using a detailed and meaningful agenda that moves beyond simple principal updates that could be sent via email or newsletter, and varying the days of the week for meetings. Other suggestions included connecting with existing school events like a welcome back barbecue, food trucks, or showing up on sports practice or band nights, and potentially planning these events with the principal to count towards school engagement hours for teachers.

Communication

Further engagement ideas involved utilizing various communication methods such as Facebook, email lists, and school newsletters. To generate interest, attendees suggested bringing in learning leaders or different teachers instead of just the principal, citing an example where inviting all the grade three teachers generated a lot of interest from parents. Other ideas included having staff or students from clubs or sports present on how funds were utilized, using red bows and signs on funded equipment during open houses to make parents aware of the council's contributions.

Volunteer Recruitment

A speaker suggested the idea of attending events at feeder schools to establish a presence and develop a succession plan with incoming parents. For casinos, it was suggested that schools partner with their community associations to support utilization of willing volunteers for both council and community casino needs.

Sports Direction

A topic briefly discussed was the CBE's direction on sports, with one independent council deciding to abstain and another expressing strong concerns, impact to their council and seeking more advocacy from the CBE. This group has parent volunteers actively writing letters.

School Welcoming Environment

One attendee noted a perceived decline in the welcoming nature of schools, mentioning difficulties connecting with staff on campus and differences in school entry policies (locked doors versus being able to ring the bell and enter the office) resulting in a feeling of disconnect.

Roundtable Format Recommendations

The Roundtable was a great forum for sharing and brainstorming and while we did not stay on the question topics, I feel that participants felt the time was useful. Having the trustee voice at the table was great - as well as having some more seasoned/experienced participant voices.

In this format, sometimes quieter and more thoughtful voices are not heard... it might be a good idea to provide sticky notes for quick jotting down of individual thoughts before thoughts are shared with the group - and these stickies could be compiled on the sheets and inform discussion.

Additionally, if the COSC really wanted the 3 questions answered, a structured timeframe for each question may have better motivated participants to stick to the topics - or at least get back on track!
