Understanding English Language Proficiency Levels

Benchmarks and Assessment

English as an Additional Language (EAL) Learners need additional language support to improve their English language skills to achieve academic success. English language skills (language proficiency) are assessed using the CBE K–12 English as an Additional Language Proficiency Benchmarks.

The EAL Language Proficiency course on the report card tells you about a student's English language skills.

Teachers collect work samples and report developing English language skills using English Language Proficiency levels called **LP levels**. These LP levels show how well a child understands and uses English in school.

The <u>Alberta K–12 English as an Additional Language Proficiency Benchmarks</u> support teachers in assessing and reporting your child's English language skills in **Listening**, **Speaking**, **Reading**, **Writing**, and **Overall** LP levels.

LP Levels can appear to drop when your child moves up to a new division. These changes may be seen in Grades 1, 4, 7, and 10. This may be because:

- there are more language demands.
- the language skills needed are more complex.
